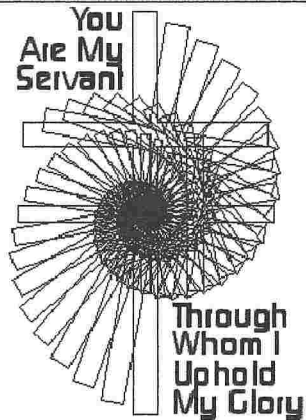

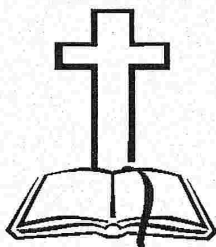

THIS WE BELIEVE

The Ten Commandments *God gave to Moses*

- I I am the Lord thy God. Thou shalt not have strange gods before Me.
- II Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.
- III Remember thou keep holy the Lord's day.
- IV Honor thy father and mother.
- V Thou shalt not kill.
- VI Thou shalt not commit adultery.
- VII Thou shalt not steal.
- VIII Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.
- IX Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife.
- X Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's goods.

The Two Great Commandments

Jesus gives us the Greatest Commandments

- 1) You shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, with your whole soul and with all your mind.
 - 2) You shall love your neighbor as yourself.
- Matthew 22:37-39*

Commandments of the Church

- 1) To assist at Mass on all Sundays and holy days of obligation
- 2) To fast and to abstain on the days appointed
- 3) To confess your sins at least once a year
- 4) To receive Holy Communion during the Easter season
- 5) To contribute to the support of the Church
- 6) To observe the laws of the Church concerning marriage.

The Church has the power from God to make laws and to change the laws that it makes. It has no power to change Divine Law

The Seven Sacraments

A Sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace

- † Baptism † Eucharist † Reconciliation
- † Confirmation † Marriage † Holy Orders
- † Anointing of the Sick

Baptize in Case of Emergency

Pour ordinary water on the forehead of the person to be baptized, and say while pouring it: "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

NOTE: Any person of either sex, who has reached the age of reason, can and should baptize in case of necessity. The same person must say the words while pouring the water.

In God there are Three Divine Persons:

- 1) God the Father 2) God the Son
- 3) God the Holy Spirit (Ghost)

The Beatitudes

- 1) Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
 - 2) Blessed are the meek: for they shall possess the land.
 - 3) Blessed are they who mourn: for they shall be comforted.
 - 4) Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after justice: for they shall have their fill.
 - 5) Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy.
 - 6) Blessed are the clean of heart: for they shall see God.
 - 7) Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God.
 - 8) Blessed are they that suffer persecution for justice' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Penitential Days and Times

All Fridays throughout the year and Lent are penitential days and times. Abstinence from meat is to be observed on Fridays however one may choose to substitute another form of penance. Abstinence and fasting are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. One must fast from all food and drink (except water and medicine) for one hour before receiving Holy Communion. One can be exempt from the penitential laws for legitimate reasons of health.

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 49:3, 5-6 / 1 Cor 1:1-3 / Jn 1:29-34

"The Lamb of God," "The one who takes away the sin of the world," "A man who is ahead of me because he existed before me," "the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit," and "the Son of God" are some of the profound descriptions for Jesus we hear from John the Baptist in today's Gospel. John could have added "my cousin" to the list, but clearly he wished to draw attention away from himself and only to Jesus.

I wonder what other descriptions we might add to the list. If someone asked you to describe who Jesus is, what would you say? Could you speak from your personal experience of Jesus?

I think sometimes, as Catholics, we miss opportunities to really get to know Jesus on a more personal level. We relate to God, the Trinity, as a whole, but we may forget to spend time with the second person of the Trinity, Jesus—who, of course, fully experienced our humanity by becoming one of us.

This week we begin the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, and we're probably back into the patterns of our "ordinary" lives after the holidays—back to school, back to work, back to having Christmas decorations packed away. But even in this most ordinary of times, we have a tremendous opportunity to come to know Jesus on a deeper level. Yes, he is the Lamb of God, the one who takes away the sin of the world. But might we through prayer, conversation, and reflection also come to know Jesus as brother, partner, healer, motivator, confidante, supporter?

If we spend some "ordinary" time with Jesus this week, we may come to know him in a whole new and not-so-ordinary way.
