

On January 28th, 1988 the Supreme Court of
Canada struck down Section 251 of the
Canadian Criminal Code, thereby legalizing
abortions throughout all nine months of
pregnancy, for any reason or no reason at all.

decision, millions of pre-born babies have
never experienced love. One in every five
pregnancies end in abortion. Abortions are
performed for socio-economic reasons, for

Theme: Water for all, Let Justice Flow Goal: Bottled Water Free Zones
Bottled water: Safer and cleaner than tap water, easy on the environment...or maybe not. Look a little deeper and you'll see that these claims don't hold water. In fact, the very opposite is often true. The bottling and selling of water creates a culture where drinking water is viewed as a commodity or a private good, available only to those who can afford to pay.

In the Global South, sales of bottled water are on the rise. At the same time, water sources are increasingly being privatized. Bottled water should never be viewed as an alternative to safe, accessible public water systems. Bottled water companies are privatizing precious water sources around the world, denying access to small-scale farmers and communities. Show your support for water justice by taking the bottled water free zone pledge.

Also, encourage cities, provinces and federal institutions to become bottled water free zones. Invite your MP, your MPP or MLA, municipality, school board or diocese to create bottled water free zones in all public institutions where clean tap water is available.

January 30, 2011 **Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Zep 2:3; 3:12-13 / 1 Cor 1:26-31 / Mt 5:1-12a

The old rabbi said, "In olden days there were people who saw the face of God."

"Why don't they anymore?" a student asked.

"Because nowadays no one stoops so low," the rabbi replied.

Our culture treasures height. We tell children, "You've gotten so big!" We nag teenagers to stand up straight. We celebrate promotions. We want to stand tall and reach high.

And there's nothing wrong with that, but the rabbi echoes the very different message in our readings today that it's not the standing tall that brings us closest to God, it's the stooping low. Zephaniah describes a humble remnant particularly close to God, and Paul says God consistently chooses to reveal the divine through the weak and broken. Today as Jesus begins his Sermon on the Mount, we hear the familiar Beatitudes, Jesus' mind-boggling statements that declare the lowliest as "blessed."

Most of us have felt "stooped low" while mourning a loved-one's death, struggling with illness, or living with heavy emotional burdens. Many are stooped low by poverty, war, and oppression. Though we often try to move quickly through mourning and illness or avert our eyes from the homeless person in front of us, we are challenged to remember that God is most present in humble moments of struggle and suffering—moments in which we are indeed stooped low.

But what if we didn't rush grieving and healing? What if we accompanied someone in an illness or took a moment to converse with that homeless stranger? Blessed will we be-for we will see God.
