

"So that we might become God"?

I cracked open my Catechism the other day and came across the following puzzling quote: "For the Son of God became Man so that we might become God" (460). Does the Church really teach that we can become God?

Dear Joshua,

The Church teaches that through Christ and the sharing of his Spirit, we can become such intimate participants in God's life that we are fully united with our Lord and Father. One way of talking about this is through the language of divinization. That's what you came across in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. The concept of divinization—human beings "becoming God"—is one the Church took on strongly during its first few centuries of life, and it continues to be a way to understand God's saving grace.

You can hear the language of divinization used regularly in the writings of many Church Fathers, early significant teachers of the faith like Saint Athanasius, whom the Catechism quotes in this passage. Divinization talk might sound odd to some Roman Catholic ears, but it is a traditional Christian way of speaking about growth in holiness and salvation that is kept alive vibrantly in the Eastern Byzantine branches of Christ's Church.

Only God can ultimately be God, but in Christ we've been offered a participation in God's life that can so thoroughly transform us, change us, and unite us with God that it is appropriate to speak of our being "divine."

Good News!

June 3, 2012 THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Dt 4:32-34, 39-40 / Rom 8:14-17 / Mt 28:16-20

While filling out pages in our daughter's baby book, my husband and I noted that while most of the book is about her, quite a few sections ask about us. Where Mom and Dad went to school, how we met, funny quirks about each other. Though she won't be interested in those sections immediately, my own experience reveals that she'll one day be quite curious about her parents. I've recently spent much time with my mom assembling old family photos, and I've delighted in the stories about her childhood and her marriage "BC"—Before Children!

This Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity is a moment to ponder about our divine Parent. The Church gives us this feast to reflect on the mystery of who God is for us. Perhaps most remarkable is the reality that we can call God our Father. Saint Paul states it beautifully: "You did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, 'Abba, Father!" We're asked to name God in the same way Jesus did-intimately, as a child to a parent. It's a privilege we should never take for granted.

Today on this feast, what can you say you know about God from your experience of being God's beloved child? The Hebrews in the first reading could tell of God's mighty deeds for them throughout history. Jesus' disciples could speak to his great miracles and the Spirit moving among them.

These rich stories make up the parents' pages of our baby book-but what can we add to them from what we have known of God?
