When do we celebrate the Ascension?

When and why did the Church decide to start celebrating Ascension Thursday on the following Sunday?

Dear Dave,

The 1982 Code of Canon Law includes The Ascension of the Lord in its list of holy days of obligation for the universal Church. It also says that the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops can cancel or move certain holy days, and the Ascension is one of those days.

American bishops have long debated moving celebration of the Ascension to a Sunday, and in 1999 the Congregation for Divine Worship in Rome granted the USCCB permission to allow each ecclesiastical province—a regional group of dioceses—to decide whether to continue celebrating the Ascension on the traditional fortieth day after Easter, which is always on a Thursday, or move it to the following Sunday.

Most of the ecclesiastical provinces moved the solemnity to Sunday. According to the USCCB's 2011 liturgical calendar, "the ecclesiastical Provinces of Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, Omaha, and Philadelphia have retained its celebration on the proper Thursday, while all other Provinces have transferred this solemnity to the Seventh Sunday of Easter."

This change has generally been made to facilitate a more ample celebration of the feast and to standardize U.S. practice with that of our neighbors in Canada and Mexico, who already opted for the Sunday celebration.

<u>Profession of Faith – New Roman Missal</u> <u>For All to become familiar with it:</u>

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Acts 1:1-11 / Eph 1:17-23 / Mt 28:16-20

SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Acts 1:12-14 / 1 Pt 4:13-16 / Jn 17:1-11a

It's a day to feel empty.

Normally, I wouldn't encourage this. But imagine how Jesus' disciples felt—first, devastated by his death; next, overjoyed at his resurrection and presence; and today, left confused and empty as Jesus departs a second time.

Military families know this emotional roller coaster: initial sadness as their soldier leaves for a foreign land, immense rejoicing when the soldier returns for a two-week leave, intensified sadness when the brief visit ends. Others know similar feelings when a child graduates and moves away or begins a new life through marriage, or when a spouse dies after a long illness.

Sometimes we seek to fill moments of emptiness with TV, shopping, gambling, or food. But the Ascension readings challenge us to stay with the emptiness for a time. Life teaches us that endings lead to new beginnings. We know that next Sunday, on Pentecost, we will celebrate a beginning—the birth of the Church—that could have occurred only through Jesus' departure.

But the time between endings and beginnings can feel quite empty.

Though nothing can truly fill those empty moments, we can take comfort in our community of family, friends, and parishioners. In the days after Jesus' departure, the disciples remained together, supporting and upholding one another.

A community of faith can do much to sustain us through days of emptiness. They can remind us of Jesus' final words in Matthew's Gospel, which are of ultimate comfort—"I am with you always, until the end of the age."
