

Why is the *Roman Missal* being revised?

I still don't understand why the Roman Missal is being revised. Can you tell me in simple terms?

Dear Zach,

The simple answer: The Church wants to have one English text that will be used by all English-speaking congregations everywhere.

Here's some background: The official Latin Roman Missal (Missale Romanum) was revised under Pope John Paul II about ten years ago. It's the third edition of the missal since Vatican II. It differs from previous missals by the addition of prayers for recently canonized saints, more prefaces for the Eucharistic Prayers, and additional Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Intentions and Votive Masses. The revised missal also contains some changes and updates on the rubrics—the instructions—for how to celebrate Mass.

Since the third Latin edition was released, bishops around the world have been working to ensure it is well translated and appropriately adapted for the flocks. They're guided by a document released in 2001 by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, *Liturgiam Authenticam*, which outlines principles and rules for translating liturgical books.

The new English translation of this third edition will reflect those guidelines and try to be more faithful to the grammatical structure of the Latin original.

May 29, 2011 SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Acts 8:5-8, 14-17 / 1 Pt 3:15-18 / Jn 14:15-21

The saying "You're your own worst enemy" rings true regularly for me. As a perfectionist, I wrangle with details on a project until it's "absolutely right," search endlessly for the "perfect" gift for a friend's birthday, or dust remote shelves no one else would notice. Later, I can see that no one expected the perfect project or gift—it was my own doing. I am my own worst enemy.

Today in 1 Peter we hear an admonition to early Christians persecuted for their faith—"Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope." I wonder, in our challenging world, if we need to remind ourselves, more than anyone else, of the reason we hope in Christ.

Are we our own worst enemy when it comes to maintaining our faith? As we face struggles like unemployment, prolonged sickness, financial troubles, or strained relationships, perhaps we need a clear reminder of the reason for our faith and the source of our hope.

I believe we hear that reason in John's Gospel. Jesus tells his disciples he will soon leave the physical world but, he claims, "I live and you will live." We persist in hope because Jesus lives. Jesus is not distant—he lives among and within us. And he promises that we will live—not just that we'll survive or barely make it. We will live, in fullness and abundance, through his love for us.

We will live here on Earth, but also we will live with God for eternity. This especially offers us hope on Memorial Day weekend as we remember those who have gone home to God

Fullness of life now and for eternity—this truly is our hope.
