

Good News!

Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Wis 11:22—12:2 / 2 Thes 1:11—2:2 / Lk 19:1-10

The human family has been around long enough to collect some real characters in the family album. Saint Thomas Aquinas, for example, will help you with your studies. Ironically, one of his nicknames was "the Dumb Ox."

Archaeologists can depend on Saint Helena. When her son the emperor Constantine made Christianity legal, she found a lot of locations in the Holy Land linked to the life of Jesus.

Dentists can turn to Saint Apollonia. Saint Jude helps with impossible cases.

Is all this silly? Actually, our saints tell us something profound about our belief in the resurrection: All those who have *died* in Christ are now *alive* in Christ. Baptized into Christ, we are linked to them in the communion of saints. As we hope to deepen in holiness, we find we're not alone. We're connected to others—sometimes strange others—who know holiness.

Let's be clear: We do not worship saints. We ask them to intercede for us. I do the same thing with my friends and my family. When my kids are traveling, I pray for their safety. I appreciate it when others pray for me when I'm sick. Saints and saints-in-progress are all in this together.

Zacchaeus had a rough past. As a tax collector, he was disliked because he worked for the Romans. He's the least likely person to end up as the hero of the story when Jesus enters Jericho. But the Lord saw this little guy up in the tree and called him closer. Jesus spent the night at his house because of his repentance and his enthusiasm.

Zacchaeus isn't a saint in the formal sense, but we can ask his help and advice about anything—including tree-climbing.

November 7, 2010 Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

2 Mc 7:1–2, 9–14 / 2 Thes 2:16—3:5 Lk 20:27–38 or 20:27, 34–38

The liturgical year is drawing to an end. The northern hemisphere is coming to the end of autumn and heading for the darker, colder weeks of winter. Days are growing shorter—and the images in today's readings are somber.

The grisly scene of martyrdom described in 2 Maccabees vividly presents the depth of faith possible from those who love God. Two centuries before Christ, these Jewish heroes knew they were choosing death when they chose to live as God called them to live.

Modern times have martyrs. The twentieth century saw more Christians lose their lives for their faith than any other century—more than all other centuries combined.


We do well to remember the ways others have given their lives. We're asked to give our lives too, not always by dying for the faith, but by living in the middle of troubling, challenging times and growing firm in faith.

We're asked to think about somber images but also to know they're not the last word. We look to those who have died as we look to Jesus' own death by crucifixion to learn that *nothing* can separate us from the love of God. Jesus reminds us that the One we serve is "not God of the dead, but of the living."

Were the Maccabean brothers different from us? They were heroes. But were they like us? They became heroes. God changes the ordinary into the extraordinary. Each Christian, in some way, is called to give his or her life to God.

Embedded in today's somber readings are strong indicators of how *God* will take us step by step through our calling. We, like the people in Thessalonica, know "the Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one."
